Uses of Present Perfect Continuous Tense

S+HAS/HAVE+BEEN+V1+ING+O+SINCE/FOR

- 1. Present Perfect Continuous Tense is used when the action started in the past and still the action is continuing.
 - 1. She has been reading for five hours. (and she is still reading).
 - 2. I have been teaching English for the past 25 years. (I am still teaching).
 - 3. They have been dancing for two hours. (still dancing).

Conclusion of Lesson Plan of Present Perfect Continuous Tense

We look at how to employ the tense with for, since, and how long to indicate repetitive actions (for example, she has been taking dance lessons for years).

Later in the lesson, we compare the use of for (for + a period of time, time not confirmed - we have been living together for twelve years) and since (since + a specific time - I have been working as teacher since May 1991), as these are important concepts to understand when using the present perfect continuous to express repeated activities.

We conclude the session by asking how long... + the present perfect continuous questions(How long you have studying in this school?) to learn more about activities that have recently ended or are still ongoing (e.g., how long have you been waiting for?)

- Students will learn the value of tenses in general and Present Perfect continuous in particular.
- Students can start filling the correct forms of verbs in examinations.
- Students will start reading and identifying the structure of Present perfect continuous tense.
- Students can increase their LSRW (listening, speaking, reading, and writing).
- Students can write something on their daily work.
